Paper Structure Guidelines

The 2022 APSA MENA Program aims to support Fellows in revising and submitting their research for publication in international peer-reviewed journals. Please submit a research proposal or full research paper examining public opinion in the MENA that you plan to discuss at the workshop. Fellows will be expected to read all the papers and serve as discussants. 4-5 papers will be selected to be presented at 2022 APSA Annual Meeting in Montreal.

- Full paper
 - Approximately 8,000 words
 - Fellows are encouraged to follow the structure of the below paper format:
 - Introduction
 - Literature review and theory
 - Research design
 - Findings and discussion
 - Conclusion
 - References
- Research proposal
 - Approximately 5,000 words
 - Paper format should include all of the above except findings.
