**PRE-CONFERENCE SHORT COURSE: Gender Equality Machinery in the Age of Disinformation and Democratic Reversal: Emerging Research Agendas**

### **Overview**

The goal of this short course is to bring together leading experts of gender equality machineries across the globe to identify and discuss the current research agenda for studying these complex and crucial institutions. The OSCE guide, *Institutional Machineries for Gender Equality as Critical Actors: A Guide for Success* (2023), based on a mixed methods study conducted in the 56 participating state of the Organization for Security and Cooperation of Europe, under Amy G. #### **PANEL: Research on Intersectionality in French Contexts: An International Dialog**

The goal of this panel is to conduct an international and comparative dialog about the empirical use of the concept intersectionality with the anchor point being intersectionality issues in France and Francophone contexts. While intersectionality has been a crucial concept in comparative gender and politics research for over ten years, it has only recently been applied by French feminist scholars. Thus, paper givers will present research that uses intersectionality as a core concept in France and francophone settings to engage a dialog with our two discussants, one a leading intersectionality scholar from USA and the other from Brazil, about how and to what end intersectionality has been used in the developing theory, knowledge and understanding on gender and the complex way in which involves other vectors of inequities.

### ***Short Course: "What's Next in Scholarship on France"***

In this half-day (four-hour) Pre-Conference Workshop, the French Politics Group of APSA brings together four, award-winning junior scholars along with prestigious scholars of France and Europe to workshop portions of their late-stage books and dissertations. While a portion of the workshop is devoted to in-depth commentary on these manuscripts, the event will also include open discussion as well, thereby providing a public platform for the next generation of cutting-edge political science research on France. Kevin Duong (Assistant Prof, University of Virginia) examines violence and democracy in French political thought; Tommaso Pavone (PhD, Princeton) brings geospatial methods and ethnographic research to the study of judicialization in Europe; Isabel Perera (PhD, Penn) compares public health policies, especially pertaining to mental health, across France and the United States; and Michelle Weitzel (PhD, the New School) studies sound as a tool of political power, with a particular focus on French Algeria. A diversity of subfields and methods is represented in the group, and France is studied both for its past and its present. This half-day Pre-Conference Workshop is ideal for senior scholars interested in the next generation of scholarship on France, junior scholars interested in France as a comparative case, and all political scientists who find value in theoretically sophisticated and contextually grounded area studies.

***Panel 2: Emotions, Political Attitudes and Referendum***

The panel gathers several papers focusing on emotions, political attitudes and referendum. A first paper studies the effect of referendum on political attitudes towards democracy. It tests a key issue related to the ongoing debate about how to cope with the democratic distrust: whether citizens like referendum as a process per se or as a mean to reach their policy goal. The second paper analyses risk-taking attitudes and referendums. It introduces a new type of risk - political risk - to understand electoral behavior in independence referendums. In a related way, the third paper investigates how emotions shape electoral behavior in independence referendum. As independence is a salient issue that very often triggers strong feelings, the paper empirically assess the extent to which three types of emotions matter.
